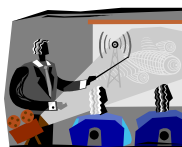

- **“Research Grants for Adult Education Math Practitioners”**

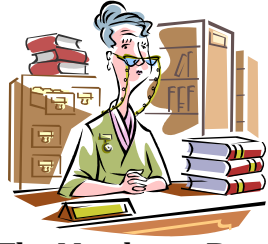

The Resource Room

The Northeast Resource Center Library is full of exciting new resources for the new year! Here are some great ideas for your classroom:

For EL/Civics:

American Civics-This set of 20 books comes in its own book display holder. There are 4 titles of 5 books each, all by David Heath. Each book contains a glossary of terms, bibliography, useful addresses and Internet sites. The set comes with a Teacher's Resource Book containing a skills correlation chart, lesson plans, activities and answer key.

The books included in this American Civics set are:

- *The Congress of the United States*-All about the Congress; how laws are made, checks and balances, a day in Congress, the U.S. Capitol and history of Congress. 41 pages
- *The Presidency of the United States*-All about the Presidency: history of the Presidency, checks and balances, the day of a president, the White House and past presidents. 39 pages
- *The Supreme Court*-All about the Supreme Court: the Supreme Court, checks and balances, the daily duties of the court, the Supreme Court building and important Supreme Court decisions. 41 pages
- *Elections in the United States*-All about elections in the U.S.: elections in a democracy, political parties, national elections, state and local elections and Election Day. 41 pages

Compass Point Books (Easy Readers)-These books are appropriate for high beginning students. They are all approximately 20 pages long and include a glossary, addresses and Internet sights for further work and an index. The series of 14 books includes:

For ESOL/GED Book Clubs:

Writer's Voices-These two sets of ten books are appropriate for intermediate readers. They are selections from the original text, and give an accurate account of the story. Each book includes discussion questions and activities. The two books included are:

- *Coal Miner's Daughter*-Loretta Lynn tells her story in her own words. Students will notice Lynn's southern dialect, word choice and grammar variations. 57 pages
- *Kramer vs. Kramer*-Selections are from the book by Avery Corman. Included are notes from the author about the book and child custody in divorce cases. 44 pages

High Five Reading: Using High-Interest Nonfiction to Guide Struggling Readers-Each set of 10 books comes with a tape recording of the text and a teacher's guide. Each book is approximately 35-40 pages long and includes an epilogue, glossary, bibliography, useful addresses and Internet sites and an index. The four sets of books include the following titles:

- *LeBron James: King of the Court*-Chapters include: "Fame, Family, Friends, Pressure and Success." ATOS Reading Level 3.1
- *Cesar Chavez: Fighter in the Fields*-Chapters include: "The Long March, Growing Up in the Fields, Beginning to Organize, Viva La Causa!, and The Long Struggle." ATOS Reading Level 3.7
- *Latino Legends: Hispanics in Major League Baseball*-Chapters include: "Closed Doors, A New Era, A Time of Giants, The Great One, and The Best Ever." ATOS Reading Level 4.1
- *Long Road to Freedom: Journey of the Hmong*-Chapters include: "Caught in the War, Life Before War, From the Jungles to the Camps, Moving to America and Going Home." ATOS Reading Level 4.4

Michigan Stories for Newcomers-These books are available in sets of 10. Written by Barbara Vaille and Jennifer Quinn Williams and published by University of Michigan Press, the stories are original fiction for adult English learners who wish to improve their reading and English skills. The stories are compelling and will become the basis for lively discussions. Each book is approximately 103 pages in length. A modified version of each story is available on www.press.umich.edu/esl/stories. The titles include:

- *Flor's Journey to Independence*-Flor, a Mexican immigrant, and her four-year-old daughter face abandonment in a strange country, but she prevails!
- *Andrew's Journey to a New Life in America*-Andrew, from Hong Kong, is trying to make a better life for his fiancée and himself when his identity is stolen!
- *Senem's Journey to a New Beginning*-Senem is a Turkish woman living in the States with her husband and son. Both natural and man-made disasters challenge her strength to survive.

Drama in the Classroom

- *Celebrating American Heroes: Plays for Students of English* by Anne Siebert. Engage your students in role playing with historic background! Heroes include: Betsy Ross, George Washington, Dolley Madison, Sacagawea, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Abraham Lincoln, Thomas Alva Edison, John Muir, Jackie Robinson, Jonas Salk, Robert Frost, Cesar Chavez, Astronauts Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins, and Jamie Escalante. Available in a set of 10 books with a Teacher's Guide and Audio CD.
